In response to the growing interest in the Middle East, the fifth edition of the Summer School critically reflects on the role of natural resources and human flows in shaping the politics of the Middle East. The challenging and highly intensive programme will provide the students with the tools to understand and explain the profound dynamics and transformations that are occurring across the region, and to re-open discussions free from oversimplifications. The Summer School favours a political science approach offering interpretations that are useful to better comprehend the main critical issues at the regional level and, at the same time, to pay attention to the on-going dynamics in some of the Countries where the Arab uprisings were generated.

The working language is English and participation is open to students and professionals willing to critically explore the complex facets of the political dynamics of the Middle East region. The detailed program is available on-line.
